

2003-2004 Energy Saving Grant Awards

Colorado Energy Science Center: \$10,500	
To implement energy upgrades in low-income homes after they've been analyzed by students who will determine effectiveness of measures. Includes: house tightening, duct sealing, insulation, furnace tune-ups, and more.	
Habitat for Humanity – Metro Denver: \$42,510	
For upgraded appliances, compact florescent lighting, increased attic and wall insulation for 17 new and 18 rehabilitated single-family homes in metro Denver for families earning less than 50% of AMI.	
The Uptown Partnership: \$11,191	
To provide high efficiency hot water heaters and new refrigerators for six low income or elderly families. The improvements are estimate to save residents \$328 annually.	
Mercy Housing – South Bluestem/Stapleton project: \$48,660	
Efficiency upgrades for 68 units for families earning 30 to 60% AMI. Includes: blown wall insulation, low-e windows, high efficiency boiler, and water heater insulation. Improvements will save each family \$105 a year.	
Mercy Housing – Durango: \$34,500	
Efficiency upgrades for apartments that will serve 46 low-income or disabled individuals. Includes: blown wall insulation, low-e windows, attic insulation, and water heater insulation, saving each unit \$311 a year.	
Habitat for Humanity – Colorado: \$100,000	
Funding to upgrade the efficiency of 30-50 new homes to Energy Star level, using these guidelines: 2x6 wall construction with R-19 minimum insulation; raised heel trusses; attic insulation to R-38 or better; low-e windows; improved air sealing; mastic on all ductwork; additional insulation to all ducts outside conditioned space; compact florescent lighting, heat recovery ventilation system. Requires an energy rating for each project.	
Rebuilding Together: \$10,000	
Efficiency upgrades for 20 low-income homes, including: wall and attic insulation; furnace and hot water heater repair and maintenance; windows and doors; appliance safety testing and replacement as needed.	
South Central Council of Governments: \$22,500	
Low-income resident loan program. They pay for standard items but get an upgraded product. Includes: Energy Star appliances; 92% efficiency furnaces; water heaters; insulation; energy efficient doors; and low-e windows.	
Colorado Energy Science Center: \$12,000	
Traveling energy hog road show, to at least 20 low-income schools. This will supplement (partially match) a \$32,000 additional contribution taken from the Ad Council budget.	
EVERGREEN RESOURCES GRANT: Habitat For Humanity of Colorado – for Trinidad HFH: \$2,000	
Evergreen Resources grant of \$2,000 for one home built in the Trinidad area, to improve the energy efficiency and/or lower the energy bills one house.	
EVERGREEN RESOURCES GRANT: Colorado Rural Housing Development Corporation: \$8,000	
For the Trinidad area to offset the higher cost of energy efficient appliances, insulation, and other energy-saving items in homes when low-income homeowners get a loan for them through their self-help program. May also include some full grants to especially low-income homeowners.
